
Global Engagement Through Social Entrepreneurship



I'm taking a Russian Literature class *in which we read* The Brothers Karamazov and Anna Karenina. The professor often referenced Crime and Punishment in his lectures, so having the background with Dostoevsky was extremely helpful. For the final, we had to write four essays in two hours given seven themes or quotes we could choose from. We were given little to no prompt and were told simply to "explicate." I just received an email from my professor that of the finals he graded personally, I received the highest grade. I just wanted to thank you and the English department for helping to prepare me for college. I honestly don't know how I would have managed without the writing and literature experience that I got at Adams. A note on "no prompts" and "explication"—this form of questioning, along with the use of *Crime and Punishment* is covered in the senior level IB English class, which prepares students very well for college level work.

New Social and Cultural Anthropology course offered

We are pleased to announce the addition of a new IB HL course to our curriculum. Beginning Fall 2012, students can take Social and Cultural Anthropology HL, expanding the course selection options for Group 3 courses dealing with individuals and societies.

Social and cultural anthropology is the comparative study of culture and human societies. Anthropologists seek an under-

standing of humankind in all its diversity. This understanding is reached through the study of societies and cultures and the exploration of the general principles of social and cultural life. Social and cultural anthropology places special emphasis on comparative perspectives that challenge cultural assumptions. Many anthropologists explore

problems and issues associated with the complexity of modern societies in local, regional and global contexts. Topics of anthropological inquiry include social change, kinship, symbolism, exchange, belief systems, ethnicity and power relations. Social and cultural anthropology examines urban as well as rural society and modern nation states (IBO). Look for this new course option this fall.



Extended Essay introduces city planning as a career

My interest in science was piqued during my junior year. I had Mr. Longenecker as an IB Biology teacher, but I knew that he also taught the Science Research class here at Adams. I saw the class as an opportunity not only to engage my interests in the sciences, but also as a chance to enhance my college applications. The class is a great way to conduct investigations before heading off to college and to explore other specific sciences that are not electives within our school. Students with whom I have shared the class per-

formed investigations within ecology, psychology, engineering, computer technology, and molecular biology. The possible investigations, however, are endless.

The study I performed measured variations in wind velocity at pedestrian level and building pressure due to changes in building shape and orientation and fed the interest I have in city planning. The research paper that I composed to present my work was also a very convenient way of completing the Extended Essay necessary for the International Baccalaureate Diploma. By finishing the essay in my junior year, I have had less to worry about this year—which is an absolute blessing! I was also lucky enough that my research caught the attention of judges in the Indiana Academy of Science Talent Search conducted by Indiana University Medical Center. I competed in the competition this past fall and finished in the top four. My success in the research program here at John Adams is possible for any organized, hardworking student, even for one as busy as an International Baccalaureate student.



ANSWERS TO IB QUESTIONS What is the "A" in CAS?

IB Diploma students are required to complete the components of the core of the Diploma Program, including the Extended Essay, the Theory of Knowledge course, and CAS: Creativity, Action, and Service.

How can students meet the *Action* requirement? According to IBO, action involves physical exertion contributing to a healthy lifestyle, complementing academic work elsewhere in the Diploma Program. This includes not only participation in individual and team sports, but also participating in expeditions and in local or international projects. For example, running on the cross-country team, playing football, going on hikes and canoeing all count as physical activities.

Students should expect to spend at least three hours per week in various CAS activities. In addition, students need to complete one longer-term CAS project (3 months or more) which links two CAS components, for example, creativity and action. Upon reaching a balance between creativity, action, and service among the 150 required hours, the student receives credit for the CAS requirement.
